

Our Peace Efforts - Fighting Human Trafficking

Our Peace Efforts - Fighting Human Carol Hart Metzker, Adrienne Livingston

Carol Hart Metzker is a consultant, writer, activist, TEDx speaker and author of *Facing the Monster: How One Person Can Fight Child Slavery.*

Since 2004, when Carol came face-toface with an 11-year-old girl who was rescued from slavery in India, she has worked to help end human trafficking. Her deep commitment includes six years of direct interaction with female survivors of human trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation at a special Pennsylvania residence, and nine years of leadership of



projects that benefit victims and survivors in India, Nepal and the US. She currently consults to The Salvation Army's New Day to Stop Trafficking program and is working to help start a home for young women who were trafficked as teens and are aging out of child protective services.

At schools and universities, faith-based and community groups, Carol has delivered hundreds of educational programs as close as a few blocks from her home in West Chester, PA, and as far away as Sydney, Australia, and Seoul, South Korea, where she spoke at Rotary International conventions. Many programs have been conducted with PA state legislators and survivors of trafficking. She has advocated for better anti-human trafficking laws and changes in how society views and treats women sold for sex—as victims instead of as criminals. In all communication she works to provide solutions as well as ugly truths, and to inspire people, instead of shaming or instilling fear, to take action.

Adrienne Livingston is from Portland, Oregon. She received her Bachelor's degree in Marketing, International Business and International Studies from Oregon State University and her Master of Arts in Intercultural Studies from Western Seminary.

She began getting involved in the Anti-Sex Trafficking movement in 2013. In October of 2014, she became the Director of Anti-Sex Trafficking Initiatives with WorldVenture. Since then she has educated over 1,500 adults and youth on this issue. You can hear

Paul Shoemaker is the Founding President of Social Venture Partners International—a global network of thousands of social innovators, entrepreneurs, philanthropists, and business and community leaders that fund and support social change agents in nearly 40 cities and 8 countries.

With insights from 17 years of this unique vantage point, he is the Northwest's leading expert on activating social change agents and a global thought leader on how individuals can be the most effective philanthropists.

In 2011 and 2012, Shoemaker was named one of the "Top 50 Most Influential People in the Nonprofit Sector" by *The Nonprofit Times,* and in 2013, was named "Philanthropist of the Year" by *Future in Review* In 2015, he received the 2015 Microsoft Alumni Integral Fellow Award

Shoemaker has spoken at TEDx and United Nations events and has written for the *Stanford Social Innovation Review*, *Fortune*, and *The Huffington Post*.

Paul was an executive with Microsoft prior to beginning his philanthropic work. In 2015 he published *Can't not do.* "Can't Not Do" is a catchphrase for the urge that captures the heart of effective social change agents—explaining, in their own words, their passion and drive: "I can't not do this." "It's not that I can do this, it's that I can't not. I could not imagine not doing something about this issue." Copies of this book will be on sale at the Institute

Jennifer Jones, Rotary International Vice President 2016-17, is the president and CEO of Media Street Productions Inc., a television production company in Windsor, ON. She is a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland and is a Past District Governor of District 6400.

In Rotary, she has held a number of positions, including three terms as seminar leader at the International Assembly and as a featured speaker at this event on four occasions.



One of Rotary International's most recognized communicators, Jennifer has presented keynote addresses and training workshops at more than 100 conferences across North America and in St Petersburg - Russia, Panama City, Bangkok, Lisbon, Finland, India, Sri Lanka, New Zealand, Australia and Germany.

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
Celebrating 68 Years


